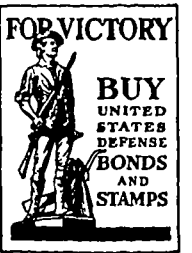

Theater-Goers Await "Romeo And Juliet"

The theatre-goers of the college, of Cornell, of Ithaca and the surrounding towns are awaiting the College Theatre's production of "Romeo and Juliet" with eager anticipation. According to Dr. Charles McGaw, the director, inquiries for ticket reservations were made as long as a week ago. Besides the usual nightly rehearsals held for the cast of forty, there have been special rehearsals of incidental songs, and of dancing and fencing scenes.

This performance of the play which is known as "the greatest statement in our literature of the problems of romantic love" is heralded by the Drama Department as one of the most ambitious of its undertakings in recent years.

Throughout the play the "star" motif, suggested by the prologue who announces the tragedy of "a pair of star-crossed lovers" is stressed in the interpretation given in the setting as well as in the playing. A skillful cutting and arrangement of scenes has provided for a smooth flowing of the play so that "waits" are eliminated.

Costume designs submitted by Brooks Costume Co. have been approved and the elaborate array of Renaissance costumes and accessories has been ordered for a week of dress rehearsals.

The Renaissance settings designed by Mr. George Hoerner have

Dr. Job Reports Trip To Capital

Upon returning from an informative trip to our nation's capital, President Job called a special assembly of the I.C. student body where he spoke on the military status of college men.

His observations were in support of the article which appeared recently in the magazine "Time". He suggested that men who are not yet of draft age (20 at this time) devote their best efforts and all of their time to their college work. Whenever they are subject to call for military service he suggested that they enlist in the Naval Reserve because this is the only reserve that gives reasonable promise of continuing for any length of time. The U. S. Army Reserve has already, in effect, been abandoned by Secretary of War Stimson's statement.

Our part in the war effort was clearly defined by the President when he made a grim appeal to us to "tighten our grip" on the fundamental principles which we are striving to attain through education. In a practical sense he referred to the vital need for conservation of time, fuel and power. For, he said, "There is no sense in sending our men into active service unless those of us at home do our part."

Bombers To Face Westchester Teachers

On October 16 at 8 o'clock, the blue and gold clad Ithaca Bombers will trot out on the field to face the West Chester Teachers at West Chester in hopes of gaining their first victory of the season.

The Bombers will have many things in their favor this time. They will have had the experience of playing one game against a good small college football team. Also Coach "Bucky" Freeman will have all the errors of the first game corrected and will have strengthened some of the positions of the teams to greater advantage. The Bombers will have had two more weeks of conditioning which will play a vital factor in this forthcoming game. The timing of the boys offensive will be better and the blocking and tackling will be harder.

A review of the Albright game reveals that the first quarter was pretty much of a punting duel with Albright slowly getting the best of it. Near the end of the quarter the Albright machine made a march to Ithaca's 10 yd. line when it stalled. On the 4th down dropped back to split the uprights for a field goal and a 3-0 lead.

Ithaca not to be outdone, came back fighting in the second quarter with some fancy ball carrying by Beckwith and Toomey. A pass from Toomey to Beckwith gained 2 5yds. On the Albright 5 yd. line 4th down Ithaca elected to pass. Toomey dropping back to heave saw no receivers face. He decided to run and neatly evaded two Albright would-be tacklers and went around right end for a touch-down. Bill Hope kicked the extra point and Ithaca led 7-3 just before the quarter ended.

In the third quarter Albright showed that they had more experience and using a series of cut-backs made two touchdowns by Jim Bennett, Albright ace.

In the fourth quarter Albright scored again. Pushman going over from the three yard line after a substantial march.

Near the end of the quarter "Bill" Hope, powerful Ithaca end, blocked a punt by Bennett and recovered it on Albrights 40. Two passes from Toomey and Bob Atwood again put Ithaca in scoring territory, but the clock was running out and one pass play failed. With three seconds to go and the ball on Albrights 10, Toomey faded back to pass and again found no receiver. He ran the ball to the

Mr. Horst, the recognized authority on pre-classic dancing, considers the stately Sarabande an ideal dance form for a tragic theme.

Fencing master for the production is Charles Lent who for the past several weeks has been instructing a group of drama students in the use of the rapier. In the beginning, his exacting training produced some rather lame actors, but they have long since recovered from their original stiffness and now use their weapons with all the grace and dexterity of Italian noblemen.

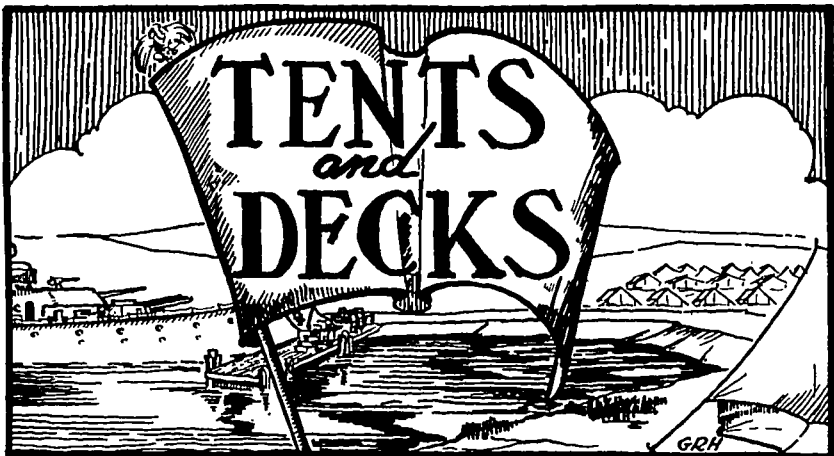

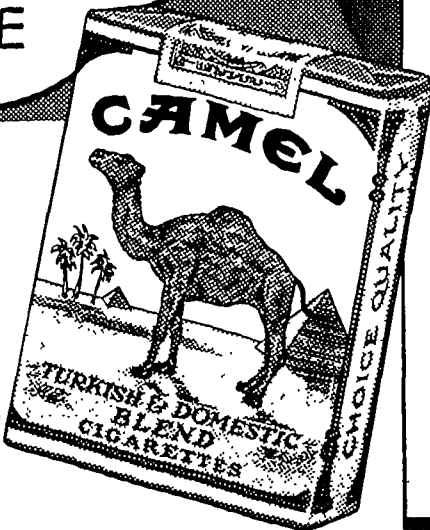
