Ithaca College Wins Easily From Hartwick

Ithaca College defeated Hartwick College on Percy Field, last Saturday, with every available member of the team seeing action.

Hartwick kicked off to Ithaca with Clark bringing the ball back to mid-field. Two plays were executed with Clark and Grace carrying the ball, placing it on Hartwick's 10 yard line. From there Clark pushed it over on a straight buck. Clark also converted the extra point by a dropkick, making the score 7 to 0 at the end of 4 minutes play.

Fuller kicked off to Hartwick, where they were downed on their own 30 yard line. Hartwick attempted three plays and were held by the stone-wall defense of the Blue and Gold forward line. Hartwick was forced to kick; Grace gathered in the punt on his 40 yard line and ran it back to midfield. Trying out their reverses and weak side bucks, the Ithacans placed the ball in scoring territory where Hatch, on a weak side buck, crossed the double marker for the second touchdown. A completed pass garnered the extra point, Grace to Hatch, totalling the score 14 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

Hartwick again received the kick-off but was forced to punt after two attempts of rushing the ball. The Blue and Gold warriors made large gains at ease and before the first half ended, Grace and Patrick crossed the Hartwick goal. The half ended with the score 26 to 0.

The third quarter started with Hartwick kicking. Clark, Ithaca's outstanding back, ran back the kickoff 85 yards for his second score of the game. In the same quarter, Patrick swept the end with a 30 yard run for his second score.

Many substitutions were now made with the yearlings proving their worth. Hartwick resorted to passing the last quarter, but they found Ithaca's pass defense too much for them. Ken Mosley, a substitution of Muscalino, stole the limelight for the reserves by intercepting one of Hartwick's passes and galloping 25 yards for the 7th and final score of the game. The extra point was converted by a pass from Lyons to Canavan. Lyons, a new back, showed great promise as a back-field candidate.

The outstanding plays during the final minutes of play were: a forty yard pass from Lyons to Elwell for a touchdown, only to have it revoked because of a penalty; Canavan, running and twisting 20 yards off tackle for another score and again kicked back because of a penalty. The game ended with the total of 45 points for Ithaca.

The game showed vast improvement in blocking and team play and also afforded opportunities to perfect new plays.

It is pleasing to know that Ithaca College is one of 25 undefeated and unscored upon teams of the east.

**A Letter to the Editor About

CITES FUTURE STANDING

Doctor Karapetoff pointed out that in a year or two the Ithaca Association of Ithaca College Alumni would not be a separate organization but one of a large group of organizations all working together. Doctor Karapetoff also read several of his original essays.
